My name is Rohit Vepa, and I recently graduated from session 18 of the FBI National Academy Youth Leadership Program, or YLP, from June 23-July 1st. Before I talk about my experience and the YLP, I would like to thank the Maryland-Delaware Chapter of the FBI National Academy Associates for providing me this unique opportunity to take part in the YLP program.

The week I spent at the FBI Academy in Quantico participating in the YLP was truly unforgettable. I made lifelong friends, met inspiring people, and learned necessary leadership skills. We were all excited to take a picture with him, and the photographer actually had to use a ladder to ensure that everyone behind Director Comey was in the picture. In the evenings we had PT. At first I thought the PT would just be vigorous workouts that pushed us to our physical limits, but we also played fun sports and team building activities. All the physical exercises we did helped prepare us for the yellow brick road, which we ran the day before graduation. Our class was so tight-knit that people who finished first went back and ran with the others to the finish line. Ringing the bell at the end of the course was extremely gratifying, and sharing that moment with my new friends made it even better. I enjoyed all aspects of the YLP: the informative classes, the delicious food, the intense PT times, and our class trip to Washington DC. I will cherish the new friends I made and lifetime lessons I learned during this program. The graduation day was a day of mixed emotions.

We were all happy to be graduating, but sad that we would not be able to spend any more time with each other. When the week started we were just nervous kids surrounded by strangers from various corners of the earth, but as the week went by we turned into a family.
